

APRIL 2024 LUTHERAN COUNSELING NETWORK

April Audrey was a challenge. She came into Sunday school like a tiny tsunami – rushing around the room, disrupting lessons, hiding behind a barrier, and distracting the other children. I responded as best I could, attempting to redirect her, enticing her into sitting with the others, setting boundaries with firmness and kindness. Nothing was working. One day I watched Casey as she peeked under the barrier at Audrey, asking her to come out. "You can sit with me," Casey gently invited. As the rest of us watched with amazement, Audrey crawled out from under the barrier. She sat right next to Casey. And later, in our prayer circle, she sat in the bigger girl's lap. Casey seemed to understand what Audrey needed; an invitation, an offer to stay close, a way into the community. Little by little, with Casey's help, Audrey joined our class and began to participate. Later Audrey wrote this prayer: "To God, I open my whole self. To breathe (stet), to pray, to be holy (stet). Listen to God and be safe. You have the courage (stet) to do it. Amen." Casey had opened a way for Audrey to come into our community and into relationship with God. And in her prayer, Audrey seemed to be opening the way for others. This is Jesus' way of invitation. FROM THE VEEP APRIL 2024



"I lift up my eyes to the hills." Psalm 121: 1

Cell phones are changing the shape of our eyeballs. I heard that in a movie recently, but I verified that scientists agree that this is so. Apparently, research done by ophthalmologists in 2021 shows that our increased screen time is elongating our eyeballs, making us increasingly nearsighted. When many of us increased our screen time during the pandemic shutdown, there was concern that this would cause new levels of eye dysfunction and it appears those fears were justified.

I was myopic/nearsighted well before the technology existed for what we now refer to as "screen time." Even back in the 1970s when I was first diagnosed with myopia, there were researchers looking into whether people

like me who did a lot of "close work" like reading and writing were making ourselves myopic or whether myopic people preferred close work, because we see best at shorter distances. Now, with increasing cases of myopia seeming to correlate with screen time, it appears that the former hypothesis may be the correct one.

Luckily, research also shows there are things we can do about this shortsightedness. First, spend more time outdoors. Studies have shown that increased sunlight decreases myopia progression. Perhaps even more important, though, is taking breaks to help the eyes rest. One suggestion is the 20-20-20 model which encourages people to take a break every 20 minutes to look at a distance at least 20 feet away for 20 seconds. My own optometrist suggested this to me, though with less specificity. Every now and then, I was told, stop and shift your gaze to a more distant view.

Not only does taking our eyes off our screens, going outside, and gazing at the horizon help our eye shape, it also allows us to reorient ourselves and see the world anew. We begin to see the forest, as well as the trees. Lifting our eyes to the hills connects us once again to God and the wonders of creation. Recently, I had the pleasure of worshipping in two different sanctuaries where the windows behind the altar open out on a natural vista. How lovely it was to lift my eyes during worship to see trees swaying gently in the background.

This year, our Synod Assembly theme is "We Lift our Eyes." We lift our eyes to see God, our neighbor, and where God is calling us. We lift our eyes to become more farsighted, to watch what God is doing in the world. We lift our eyes metaphorically, to envision God's purpose for us.

There is a ton of information about the assembly on the synod website. We are still looking for volunteers to help with the event itself, and also nominees for various council, committee, and Churchwide Assembly positions. We hope you will join us as we lift our eyes!
